ABOUT THE ADVOCACY AGENDA

This document contains information regarding critical priorities for Dungog Shire to help create and maintain a safe and accessible road network and provide quality community facilities.

This is a blueprint for Dungog Shire Council to advocate on behalf of its community to ensure federal and state funding is directed to the highest needs infrastructure priorities to improve quality of life for all shire citizens.

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A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dungog Shire is a vibrant and growing region, with a sustainable economy.

Ours is an area where rural character, a sense of community and lifestyle are preserved.

Dungog Shire Council currently manages a 717.39km road network, which represents one of the largest in NSW.

Due to our relatively small ratepayer base, council relies on federal and state grant funding to deliver critical infrastructure upgrades.

Over 52% of council's annual revenue is from grants and contributions.

Essential upgrades to our transport, community and social infrastructure serve to keep locals employed, support tourism and contribute to our regional economy, all while improving quality of life for our residents and visitors.

Council is committed to working together with all levels of government, agencies, and like-minded organisations to achieve the priority infrastructure goals for Dungog Shire.



This document details these priorities and calls on our parliamentary representatives to provide support and funding to enable us to address these critical infrastructure needs.

It is our aim to provide every citizen of Dungog Shire facilities and infrastructure to a standard they deserve.

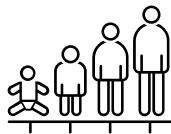

INFRASTRUCTURE MANAGEMENT

Council currently manages a 717.39km road network - one of the largest in NSW.

Council relies on federal and state grant funding to deliver critical and endorsed infrastructure upgrades to our road network and importantly, to keep locals employed, support tourism and contribute to the regional economy.

With the National Party securing \$34B for regional areas and critical infrastructure as a result of its support for zero carbon emissions by 2050, we're advocating for a share of this funding to improve essential infrastructure for all citizens of Dungog Shire.



STATE OF PLAY

Dungog Shire Council's advocacy priorities support the Australian Local Government Association's national advocacy campaign.

Economic recovery priorities include:

- An initial injection of Financial Assistance Grants to local government of \$1.3 billion.

This will serve to support communities and jobs, and also resolve the current practice of bringing forward two quarterly Financial Assistance Grant payments each year.

- A commitment to return Financial Assistance Grants to at least 1% of Commonwealth taxation revenue via a phased approach.

GRESFORD SUSPENSION BRIDGE

The Gresford Suspension Bridge over the Paterson River at Gresford is a 72.3 metre bridge connecting Gresford to an isolated community to the west of the Paterson River.

The suspension bridge requires funding of approximately \$3M to be replaced. An application by Dungog Shire Council was unsuccessful in Round 1 of the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges program because the bridge had too many non-timber components. Council has since applied for funding under Round 2 of this program; however, has been advised that the funding guidelines, although reviewed by the NSW Government, will likely exclude this bridge for the same reason.

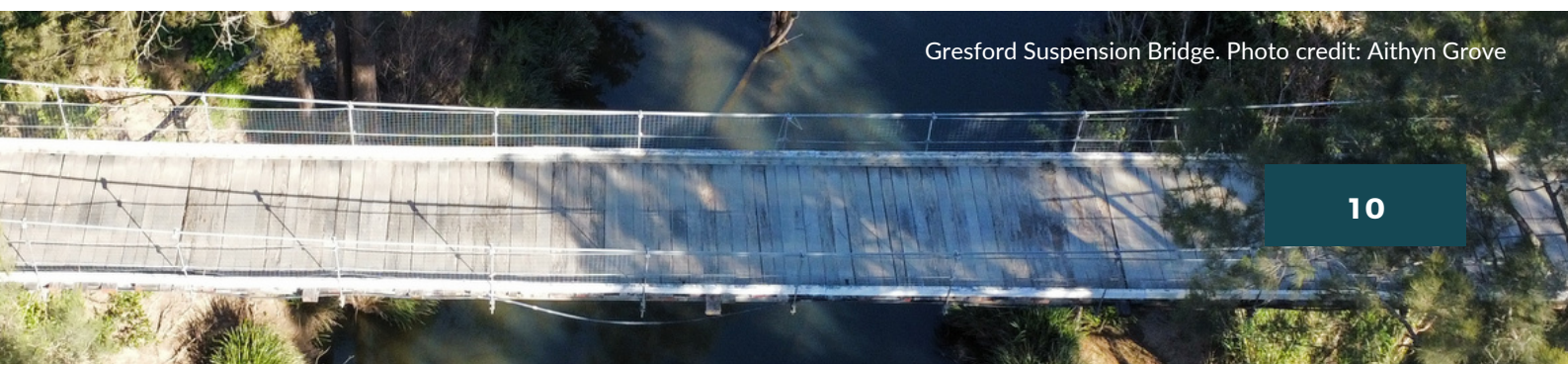
There are seven families isolated on the western side of the Paterson River who rely on access over this bridge.

There is a river crossing provided, which is critical for larger vehicles that cannot safely use the suspension bridge; however, this river crossing frequently washes away during flood and rain events, making access to primary producer markets and local services very difficult for the residents.

A new bridge is needed to provide safe and reliable access for residents and the local community.

Given the difficulties in obtaining state government funding, Dungog Shire Council seeks \$3M in funding from the Australian Government through federal bridge funding programs to enable the replacement of this bridge.

EXPANDING MOBILE COVERAGE IN OUR REGIONAL COMMUNITY
