# **3 PLANNING CONTEXT**

#### 3.1 General Description of LGA

Dungog LGA is located inland and to the north of Newcastle in the Hunter Region of NSW, and comprises a total area of approximately 2,265 km<sup>2</sup>. The LGA's largest population centre is the township of Dungog, located approximately 75 kilometres north of Newcastle and 215 kilometres north of Sydney. Other main population hubs include the townships and villages of Paterson, Clarence Town, Gresford (and East Gresford), Martins Creek and Vacy, all of which are located in the southern half of the LGA.

The LGA is bounded to the north by the mountainous Barrington Tops plateau, and comprises generally steep and hilly country that becomes less rugged towards its southern reaches. The landform typically consists of cleared rural land; a significant proportion of forested land, including national parks and State Forests; and small settlements and villages dotted around the region, predominantly centred in the southern half of the LGA. The LGA contains two main rivers, the Williams to the east and the Paterson to the west, both of which traverse in a general north-west to south-east direction. A third river, The Allyn, joins the Paterson River at Vacy.

Some of the LGA's major industries include dairy and beef production; poultry meat production; timber; and a growing tourism industry, centred on the natural mountain topography and wilderness areas. Aside from agriculture, education and training, retail trade, healthcare and social administration, and safety are the major employers. Small businesses employing less than four people dominate the business community.

The LGA's first inhabitants were thought to be the Gringai Tribe, who formed part of the Wanaruah Tribe. 'Dungog' is an Aboriginal name which means 'place of thinly wooded hills'. European settlement of the LGA occurred in the early 1800's when settlers were initially attracted by the numerous cedar trees for timber production. Later settlement was typically driven by agricultural production, and in more recent times, by the quality and range of rural and rural residential lots in the southern part of the LGA, where many residents consider the proximity to Newcastle and Raymond Terrace attractive.

In the ABS Census in 2001, the LGA had a population of 7,875. This rose to 8,062 in 2006. The average density of the population is indicated below with Dungog having 8,062 people in an area of 2,248 km<sup>2</sup>, representing 7.3% of the total Hunter area land mass.

The local population and area, relative to the Lower Hunter and Hunter Region is shown in Table 1 below.



#### 3.2 Rivers, Water Catchments & Regional Administration Boundaries

There are two main river catchments within the LGA; the Williams River catchment (dominated by the Williams River) and the Paterson-Allyn catchment (dominated by the Paterson River and the Allyn River). The LGA is further subdivided into a number of smaller sub catchments. The main towns and villages drain into these waterways in the following way (Hunter Water Australia Strategic Services, 2000):

- The town of Dungog drains into the Williams River
- Paterson drains into the Paterson River
- Clarence Town drains via Town Creek into the Williams River
- Gresford generally drains to the Paterson River
- East Gresford generally drains to the Allyn River

The location of the main rivers within the Dungog LGA is shown in Map 3.1. The LGA is wholly contained within the Hunter-Central Rivers catchment, and is administered by the Hunter-Central Rivers Catchment Management Authority. The proposed Tillegra Dam catchment is located along the Williams River, in the Williams River valley at Tillegra. Map 3.2 shows the location of the proposed Tillegra Dam catchment.






### Tillegra Dam Catchment



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The Local Government Areas that adjoin the Dungog LGA are Singleton, Upper Hunter, Gloucester, Great Lakes, Port Stephens and Maitland. The Dungog LGA and its adjoining LGA's are all included within the Hunter Planning Region, as identified by the Department of Planning (DoP).

Other boundaries relevant to this study are Biogeographic Regions and Aboriginal Land Council Boundaries. These can be viewed at Maps 3.3 and 3.4.



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
### LEGEND IBRA REGION - NSW NORTH COAST





# Interim Biogeographic Regionalisation For Australia - IBRA Regions









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
For the purpose of the Situation Analysis, the LGA has been divided into general planning 'districts' in order for significant planning issues to be considered. These districts primarily focus on the main population centres and their surrounding rural areas. In some cases the urban and rural areas may also be differentiated into 'precincts'.

Some additional planning precincts have been selected to identify areas of special interest. These are the Proposed Tillegra Dam Catchment and the Dungog Shire Council's Section 94 catchments. These precincts may overlap with the general precincts and districts listed above.

The precincts and districts used in this analysis are listed in Table 2 below. The general planning districts and precincts are shown on Map 3.5 and the 'special interest' precincts are shown on Map 3.6.


